Notes on the Week

When Lent and Pascha are late, like this year, we hear of the Canaanite Woman on this Sunday before the Sunday of Zacchaeus. Like Zacchaeus, this woman zealously pursued the Lord, even when others wanted to hold her back. She knew her need—that only the Lord could heal her daughter—and she did not stop asking until she was heard. Even when it seemed Jesus himself rebuffed her, she pressed on. And for that, the Lord praised her faith and her daughter was healed.

From that time, the Church has pointed to this woman as an example of prayer in the face of adversity. When it seems that no one hears us, or that the Lord has turned a deaf ear to our need, remember the Canaanite Woman. Lord, hear us and have mercy!
