# The Reading from the Holy Gospel according to St. Luke (2:22–40)

At that time, the parents of the Child brought Jesus to Jerusalem to present Him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every male who opens the womb shall be called holy to the Lord"), and to offer a sacrifice according to what is said in the law of the Lord, "A pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons." And behold, there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon, and this man was just and devout, waiting for the Consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. And it had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ. So he came by the Spirit into the temple. And when the parents brought in the Child Jesus, to do for Him according to the custom of the law, he took Him up in his arms and blessed God and said: "Lord, now You are letting Your servant depart in peace, according to Your word; for my eyes have seen Your salvation, which You have prepared before the face of all peoples, a light to bring revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of Your people Israel." And Joseph and His mother marveled at those things which were spoken of Him. Then Simeon blessed them, and said to Mary His mother, "Behold, this Child is destined for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign which will be spoken against (yes, a sword will pierce through your own soul also), that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." Now there was one, Anna, a prophetess, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, and had lived with a husband seven years from her virginity; and this woman was a widow of about eighty-four years, who did not depart from the temple, but served God with fastings and prayers night and day. And coming in that instant she gave thanks to the Lord, and spoke of Him to all those who looked for redemption in Jerusalem. So when they had performed all things according to the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own city, Nazareth. And the Child grew and became strong in spirit, filled with wisdom; and the grace of God was upon Him.

#### Notes on the Week

The Meeting of the Lord in the Temple comes forty days after his Nativity. According to the Law, every mother had to bring an offering in the Temple forty days after giving birth: a lamb for a burnt offering and a turtledove for a sin offering; or if she could not afford a lamb, then another turtledove. The Theotokos, though pure herself, nonetheless made this offering so that the Lawgiver could fulfill the Law, which he himself had given to Moses. The parents of Jesus Christ came with two turtledoves, both revealing their poverty and pointing to the true Lamb who would be sacrificed for the salvation of the whole world.

In the Temple, the Lord is met by St. Simeon the Righteous and St. Anna the Prophetess, both of whom understand that Jesus is the promised Christ sent by God as "the salvation which you have prepared before the face of all peoples" (Luke 2:31). St. Simeon foretells that this salvation will require sacrifice as well, and said to the Virgin Mary: "yes, a sword will pierce through your own soul, also." So we should understand the Meeting of the Lord both as one of the signs of the coming of the Christ and also as a sign of the sacrifice on the Cross.

All these things took place in the earthly Temple, but they reveal that its purpose was passing away. The Temple in Jerusalem was built as the meeting place between God and his people, but it could never contain God, nor could the people of God dwell there. That early Temple was later destroyed, as Jesus himself foretold. But the Lord came to establish a heavenly Temple that will never pass away, that would be the place where God and Man meet face to face, and we will rejoice in that sight forever.
